Source A: Responsible fashion

The head of H&M clothing company wants the business to be run in a way that is economically, socially and environmentally responsible. H&M is taking steps to improve conditions for workers in developing countries. H&M has already taken action in Bangladesh, where many of its clothes are made. The company is:

- saving 300 million litres of water using new production methods
- donating two million garments to charities
- educating garment workers in Bangladesh about their rights
- insisting that factory owners pay a minimum wage that is fair to Bangladeshi workers.

Source B: The Fairtrade Foundation

The Fairtrade Foundation was established to help provide improved and stable payments to workers in the developing world. It also wants to see improved working conditions.

It is not just Fairtrade food that has become popular in recent years. You can now buy Fairtrade jeans, footballs and even Fairtrade gold!

However, there are limits to what Fairtrade can achieve. Not every single customer in the world will want to pay a higher price for a cup of coffee. It is therefore not possible for all coffee growers to work with Fairtrade. Some people think that Fairtrade coffee farmers should grow a wider range of crops.

Source C: Global warming

Many scientists predict more 'extreme weather' could be one worrying consequence of global warming. Examples of extreme weather include:

- higher temperatures and more sunshine in some regions, leading to unusual drought and increased wildfires
- heavier rainfall and more hurricanes, leading to flooding and property damage.

In addition, scientists say global warming may bring a shrinking habitat for many animals, due to environmental change. Based on their own predictions, scientists expect to see a spread of diseases into new areas. However, most scientists would accept that their predictions may not turn out to be perfectly accurate.

Many residents of Hinkley in Somerset do not want another nuclear power station to be built near them. Since Japan's Fukushima nuclear power station exploded in 2011, Hinkley residents are worried that an accident could affect them too. Posters designed by residents show their concerns about the new 'Hinkley C' power station. These posters can be viewed at their website.

The UK government passed the Climate Change Act in 2008. This means that the UK government is now forced, by law, to make major cuts to Britain's greenhouse gas emissions. In a statement, the government said: 'We believe nuclear power can help the UK meet its climate change targets.'

Source E: World population

In 2012, the world's population reached 7 billion. It is likely to reach 9 billion by 2050 because of people living longer and the high birth rate found in some societies. This will put increased pressure on the Earth's natural resources, which are needed for the survival of people, animals and plant populations. Sustainable development may no longer be achievable.

Some experts are also worried by changing lifestyles, not just how many people are being born.

- Citizens of Brazil, China, India and other large developing countries want the same lifestyle as people in the UK and USA possess.
- Wealthy people put more pressure on the Earth's natural resources than very poor people do.
- There may not be enough food, water and energy to go around.
